What is a Specialist Breast Centre?

A Specialist Breast Centre offers specialist services to women who have been referred by their doctors. International research has shown that diagnosis and treatment in specialised centres improve survival rates for women diagnosed with breast cancer by 25 to 30%. The centres must see a large number of patients in order that personnel maintain expertise. All doctors and nurses in specialist centres have specific training in dealing with breast disease. National Quality Assurance Standards have been developed and HIQA (Health Information and Quality Authority) accredits centres based on these standards.

Where are these Centres located?

The centres are listed in this leaflet. You may also contact us or check our website. The centres are usually separate areas within hospitals and the people you meet there will all have special expertise in breast cancer.

Why would I need to go to a Specialist Breast Centre?

If you have a problem with one or both of your breasts go to your doctor.

If you or your doctor are still concerned then your doctor should refer you to a Specialist Breast Centre. Problems that require urgent attention include a lump or thickening in the breast, changes in the surface of the breast including dimpling, orange peel appearance or any unusual change in size or texture, changes to the nipple such as recent inverted nipple, or discharge, especially if bloodstained.

Only 10% of women who go to a Specialist Breast Centre have cancer but it is very important that you get any symptom checked out by experts.

Can I bring someone with me?

Yes, please feel free to bring someone with you; partners, family members or friends are welcome.

What can I expect at these Centres?

Whatever your symptoms are you may have some or all of the following investigations. Together these are known as

Triple Assessment

Clinical Examination This involves the surgeon or a member of his/her team taking a history of your symptoms and carrying out an examination of your breasts and underarm area.

Radiology This involves a mammogram (X-ray examination of the breast) and maybe an ultra-sound scan of your breast.

Breast Tissue Sampling This involves a doctor using a needle to remove a small sample of breast tissue for examination under a microscope.

How soon will I know the results?

Results of the test may be available on the same day or may require a return visit to the clinic within two weeks.

What happens next?

The majority of women referred to a Specialist
Breast Centre do **NOT** have Breast Cancer.
However, if a woman is diagnosed with Breast
Cancer, then her treatment programme is planned at a Multidisciplinary Conference.

Multidisciplinary Teams have special expertise and training in breast cancer and are made up of

Breast Surgeons who specialise in breast diseases.

Radiologists who specialise in the study of X-Rays, including mammograms and ultra-sound scans.

Pathologists who examine breast tissue.

Breast Care Nurses who specialise in breast care.

Medical Oncologists specialising in the treatment of cancer by drug therapy (Chemotherapy).

Radiation Oncologists specialising in the treatment of cancer with radiation therapy.

Following the conference you will meet with the appropriate specialists to discuss your individual treatment plan. This may include a **Plastic Surgeon** if you need and wish to discuss reconstruction.

Specialist Breast Cancer Centres

In September 2007, The Health Services Executive announced the location of 8 designated Specialist Cancer Centres in Ireland and confirmed that these centres will provide treatment for all forms of cancer, involving diagnostic, surgical, medical (systemic) and radiation oncology services.

Breast cancer services have now been transferred to the 8 centres, which are listed overleaf.

Diagnosis and surgery will take place in these Centres, as will the planning of individual treatment programmes. Chemotherapy will be provided at a hospital as close as possible to where you live.
